Living Together With Disagreement

Once a little boy was playing outdoors and found a fascinating caterpillar. He carefully picked it up and took it home to show his mother. He asked his mother if he could keep it, and she said he could if he would take good care of it. The little boy got a large jar from his mother and put plants to eat, and a stick to climb on, in the jar. Every day he watched the caterpillar and brought it new plants to eat.

One day the caterpillar climbed up the stick and started acting strangely. The boy worriedly called his mother who came and understood that the caterpillar was creating a cocoon. The mother explained to the boy how the caterpillar was going to go through a metamorphosis and become a butterfly. The little boy was thrilled to hear about the changes his caterpillar would go through. He watched every day, waiting for the butterfly to emerge. One day it happened, a small hole appeared in the cocoon and the butterfly started to struggle to come out.

At first the boy was excited, but soon he became concerned. The butterfly was struggling so hard to get out! It looked like it couldn't break free! It looked desperate! It looked like it was making no progress! The boy was so concerned he decided to help. He ran to get scissors, and then walked back (because he had learned not to run with scissors...). He snipped the cocoon to make the hole bigger and the butterfly quickly emerged! As the butterfly came out the boy was surprised. It had a swollen body and small, shriveled wings. He continued to watch the butterfly expecting that, at any moment, the wings would dry out, enlarge and expand to support the swollen body. He knew that in time the body would shrink and the butterfly's wings would expand. But neither happened! The butterfly spent the rest of its life crawling around with a swollen body and shriveled wings. It never was able to fly...

As the boy tried to figure out what had gone wrong his mother took him to talk to a scientist from a local college. He learned that the butterfly was SUPPOSED to struggle. In fact, the butterfly's struggle to push its way through the tiny opening of the cocoon pushes the fluid out of its body and into its wings. Without the struggle, the butterfly would never, ever fly. The boy's good intentions hurt the butterfly.

And so it is in our community of faith. Struggle is an important part of the journey to new life. Without it we cannot spread our wings and be who God calls us to be as a discipling community for all ages.

Recently, we've been having some disagreement about the new worship schedule. This disagreement has made some of us uncomfortable. There has been a movement among us to quickly resolve this tension by moving one way or another, voting a plan up or down, enacting plan A over Plan B. We must not give in to the temptation of reacting quickly to this tension. We need to recognize it and let it live among us, while seeing that it can be used to strengthen us as new life emerges.

The butterfly has long been a symbol of the resurrection to new life through Jesus Christ. We are people who are challenged by Jesus to embrace the struggles of life and to be changed by them, to stretch and to strain with them. We must not try shorten our struggles in order to make us feel more comfortable. Rather, we need to engage the questions raised and to walk with one another in our disagreements and to love and respect one another as we differ. There is no getting to Easter without first enduring the tensions of the whole story leading up to Good Friday's crucifixion. New and vigorous life comes out of struggle.

Tension can be a blessing to a community, if it is embraced and seen as an important part of vitality. Disagreement should not be feared, but recognized for its holy value. For where there is conflict, we discover that we are dealing with matters of importance. As we struggle with differences about worship time, let's not quickly move to a resolution that does not honor the struggles of those who disagree. We need the rub of the rough cocoon to stretch our wings, the tug of where we once found comfort to pull as we try to emerge into the future. We will be OK when we disagree as a community, so long as we do it patiently and faithfully. It is critical to remain connected to one another, not giving in to the temptations to criticize those with whom we disagree, but to stay focused on the issues before us. New life will come as we honor the processes and struggles of issues before us.

New life for our congregation will not come without struggle. So, let us remember that Christ is the Lord of all struggles. He does not evade them, but enters into the fray to bless the journey, so that new life might emerge. We need to walk together and talk with one another honestly and carefully in our disagreements, always explaining our neighbors' actions in the kindest of ways. As we do this, let's remember that new life will come as we struggle. (LJ)

Boiler Update

At the request of the congregation, the church council has selected an engineer to guide us as we move forward in our boiler work. Galileo Consulting Group will study our existing system and draw up plans to present to a contractor to make modifications to our system. Right now, we believe that we are generating enough heat for our buildings. The work that remains is related to getting the heat from the boiler to the right places in our buildings. Galileo group will design a distribution system to make sure the heat is distributed properly. After design plans are in completed we will solicit bids for a contractor to make necessary modifications to our system. When all of this is completed we will have an efficient heating system meeting the needs of our congregation for many years into the future. How to participate as an adult: You can contribute to their effort by donating to the ELCA Global Hunger Appeal. You can place a gift in the offering or you can give it to one of our young people either before or after services on March 7th. Ask them about their experience and give to our local food pantry! You are also invited to try to go 30 hours without eating and join us for a potluck following worship on the 7th. 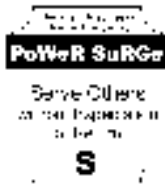

Sunday, February 7th Julie Kons, Executive Director, Urban Ministries of Lutheran Social Services and Kim Sines, director of project recovery, were present in worship and led an adult forum during the Sunday school hour. They shared how our on going support makes it possible for Lutheran Disaster Relief (LDR) to respond quickly when disaster occurs. LDR is the combined efforts of both the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America and the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod. Their yearly budget is 85 million, but the real strength of what they are able to accomplish lies in how neighbors are invited and enabled to help neighbors.

Sines shared how project recovery continues to assist flood victims in our own area. Although the floods are now a couple years away, their affects continue to be real and on going for many people. Project Recovery continues to meet at Good Shepherd on Mondays and their work makes it possible for many in our community to find a way back to a healthy life. (MH)
